FISCAL DISCIPLINE SAVES TAXPAYERS MILLIONS OF \$\$\$

Once again, Moody's Investors Service, as well as Standard and Poor's, reaffirmed Oakland County's AAA Bond Rating, the highest government credit rating possible. "So what?" you may ask yourself. "Why should I care?" The answer is simple. Every government, from time to time, must borrow money by issuing bonds for capital improvements, new buildings, upgrades, and the like. This money must be paid back with interest. The higher the bond rating, the less interest governments must pay to borrow money. In the case of Oakland County, our AAA bond rating means county taxpayers save \$2 to \$3 million annually in interest payments - high interest that counties with lower bond ratings must pay.

Oakland County is one of only 49 counties, out of more than 3,000 in the entire United States, with a AAA bond rating. The reason we are able to maintain our high rating is Oakland County's ability to keep pace with rapidly changing financial circumstances, and our unwillingness to tap into the General Fund to balance our budget. We make difficult choices to keep our budget balanced.

Before renewing our AAA rating, Moody's and Standard and Poor's expressed concern about our ability to repay loans, given the declining state of the Michigan economy. We responded by pointing out the \$1.2 billion in new investment generated by Oakland County's Emerging Sectors initiative, which has created nearly 15,000 jobs in just four years. We also described the county's new Medical Main Street program, designed to transform Oakland County into a "medical tourism" destination. This program involves a five-point strategy for making Oakland County synonymous with the Cleveland and Mayo clinics and Johns Hopkins as a leading health care location. We understand that the auto industry may never dominate the local economy as it used to. That is why we are working very hard to diversify our economy. So far, our efforts have been quite productive.
