

## It's Time To Get Tested For LEAD!



### Know the Facts . . .

- Lead poisoning affects every system of the body but many parents don't know their children are lead poisoned until it's too late. Lead poisoning often has no symptoms.
- Younger children are at a greater risk because of their hand-to-mouth behavior, their bodies absorb lead at a high rate and their developing nervous system makes it easier for them to be lead poisoned.
- Children who were exposed to lead when they were toddlers often have reading disabilities, lower vocabulary scores, increased absences from school and a higher rate of school failure.

Lead poisoning can be treated if it's caught early. Children should be tested for lead poisoning at ages one and two to prevent learning and behavior problems.
