26	Local programs (decentralized approach, community-based, school district boundaries).
3	Tri-sponsored with the school districts, municipalities and the Circuit Court-Family Division.
2	Pronged approach (Casework and Community Organization).
\$1,302,211	Local sponsor cash and in-kind contributions.
\$1,002,835	Additional funds secured by volunteers through grants, donations, and fundraising.
5,542	Families received confidential, family-focused, short-term casework services.
2,091	Families received information and referral services.
60/25/12/3	Percent of referrals received from the Schools (60%), Police (25%), Parents (12%), Others (3%).
12/12/7/6	Percent of total for four highest offense-related referral reasons: School Truancy (12%), School Incurrigibility (12%), Retail Fraud (7%), and Alcohol/Drug Related (6%).
60/40	Percent of male/female casework clients.
12.5	Average age of youth referred for casework services.
104	Youth matched with a caring adult through the Mentors Plus program.
153	Caseload youth who participated in the U-Turn jail tour.
8,997	Hours of Community Service that Youth Assistance caseload youth performed.
90%	Success rate for youth receiving YA casework services. No subsequent contact with Probate or Circuit Court. Based upon three-year study conducted by MSU completed in 1992.
900	Volunteers who served as board members, subcommittee members, or task volunteers who planned and implemented prevention programs.
52,833	Number of hours volunteers devoted to Youth Assistance.
30,572	Total number of Community Organization program participants.
