Oakland County, MI Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Application Guide

A guide designed to assist participating communities to complete their annual application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. The guide outlines the application process and provides specific instruction on proper completion. The PY 2026 CDBG Application Workshop was held virtually on Thursday, September 25, 2025.

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INTRODUCTION

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program - CDBG is a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program that provides funds annually to entitlement jurisdictions. Federal regulations 24 CFR Part 570 set forth eligible activities and CDBG national objectives. CDBG funds housing, public facility and public service activities that benefit low-income households and persons with special needs. Oakland County receives CDBG funds as an "urban county". Participating communities have a population below the threshold for entitlement status and must join with the County to receive CDBG or meet the population threshold but opt of participation with the "urban county". The City of Pontiac participates in the "urban county" as a Metropolitan City. Projects must be eligible, in conformance with activities to be funded and meet at least one of the following CDBG national objectives:

NATIONAL OBJECTIVES

- 1. Primarily benefit low-income persons or households** - This is the most commonly used qualifier. Documentation of the benefit to low-income level persons is required of every project funded under this objective.
 - Limited clientele activities, i.e., those which benefit a specific sector of the community must benefit a minimum of 51% low-income persons.
 - Activities that benefit all residents within a defined geographic area can meet the low-income benefit requirement if the area meets the urban county exception criteria of a minimum of 45.08% low-income residents, as calculated from Census data provided by HUD.
 - Direct benefit activities are those such as Minor Home Repair and Public Services- Youth Services that directly benefit qualified low-income households.

- 2. Aid in the elimination of slum or blight conditions** - HUD has strict guidelines. Contact the HUD Coordinator at (248) 858-5312 to determine project eligibility.

- 3. Meet an urgent community need** - Generally, this objective is used in the case of recent serious natural disasters (e.g., earthquake, flooding) and only when other funds are not available.

CDBG ACTIVITIES MUST MEET A DOCUMENTED NATIONAL OBJECTIVE

Consolidated Plan - The Oakland County Consolidated Plan (Con Plan) is submitted every five years pursuant to U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) (24 Part 91, 1/5/95). The Con Plan represents a single submission covering the planning and application aspects of HUD's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership Act (HOME) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) formula programs. The purpose of the Con Plan is to describe activities to be undertaken every five years in conjunction with HUD programs by the Oakland County HOME Consortium. Oakland County serves as the lead agency for the HOME Consortium, which is comprised of the Urban County of Oakland, City of Farmington Hills, City of Royal Oak, and City of Southfield. The Con Plan is designed to assess housing and community development needs and describe market conditions to address priority needs.

OAKLAND COUNTY CDBG PROGRAM

Local governments are known as grantees or recipients in the CDBG entitlement program. A grantee or recipient may be eligible to receive CDBG funds if they are a city in a metro area of over 50,000 in population, a designated principal city, or an urban county with more than 200,000 people. States may also receive funding directly from HUD and provide it to small cities (non-entitled communities). Oakland County is responsible for execution of its Community Development program, following its Consolidated Plan and meeting other applicable law requirements including:

- National Environmental Policy Act
- Uniform Relocation Act
- Fair Housing Act
- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964
- Sec. 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973
- Sec. 109 of Title I of Housing & Community Development Act of 1974
- Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990
- Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing

The County's responsibility must include these functions even where as a matter of administrative convenience or State law, the county permits cooperating units of general local government to carry out essential community development and housing assistance activities.

Three Year Cooperation Agreement - As an urban county, Oakland County is required to maintain cooperation agreements with each of its subrecipients. HUD provides notification to the County of its requirements under the Cooperation Agreement every three years. The notice includes guidance on qualification actions to be taken, cooperation agreements/amendments, notification of opportunity to be excluded; included, notification of split places and notification of opportunity to terminate.

Annual Subrecipient Agreement - Federal regulations require Oakland County as an "urban county" grantee to execute an annual Subrecipient Agreement with each participating community. The Subrecipient Agreement spells out obligations under the Code of Federal Regulations at 24 CFR 570.503. The agreement is in effect during any period that the subrecipient has control over CDBG funds including program income. Minimally, the Subrecipient Agreement shall include a statement of work, record and reporting requirements, program income rules, uniform administrative requirements, other program requirements, a suspension and termination clause and guidance on reversion of assets. A fully executed Subrecipient Agreement is required before disbursing CDBG funds.

Uniform Grant Guidance (UGG) - The Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards at 2 CFR § 200 streamlines and consolidates government requirements for receiving and using federal awards to reduce administrative burden and improve outcomes. Published in the Federal Register (79 Fed. Reg. 75871) on December 19, 2014, the UGG became effective for new and continuation Federal awards issued on or after December 26, 2014.

System for Award Management - CDBG participating communities must register with the Federal System for Award Management (SAM), and must have a correct UIE # to receive a federal award.

HUD INCOME LIMITS

Income Limits - CDBG relies on HUD annual area median income (AMI) data to determine the eligibility for activities that directly benefit a person or household and to determine area wide benefit. The income limits below are effective as of 06/01/20 25. The maximum income level for CDBG is Low-Income or 80% of AMI based on household size.

CDBG PROGRAM RULES

As an urban county entitlement community, Oakland County distributes funds to participating communities. The County administers the Community Development Block Grant Program through the Neighborhood & Housing Development Division of the Health & Human Services Department and has the final responsibility for determining the method of allocating funds covered under this agreement.

1. Under a **hybrid funding method Oakland County provides all participating communities with a formula-based allocation for Public Services. Infrastructure, Public Facilities, and other activities** funding will be distributed through a competitive process. 60% of the Urban County Allocation is reserved for the 52 participating communities for Competitive Proposal Process
2. Communities interested in pursuing competitive funding must submit applications, which will be reviewed and scored by NHD. Accepted projects will be announced prior to the availability of PY2026 funding. Once final funding allocations are confirmed by HUD, necessary adjustments will be made and communicated.
3. All communities will receive funding for **Public Service Activities** with a minimum activity amount of **\$3,500**.
4. Applications for Non-Public Service Activities will be scored by a committee within Oakland County
5. Accepted projects will be announced prior to the availability of PY2026 funding. Once final funding allocations are confirmed by HUD, necessary adjustments will be made and communicated.
6. Funding may not be reallocated to another activity.
7. **15% Public Service Cap** - Oakland County can only allocate a **maximum of 15% of the annual entitlement to fund Public Services**.
8. **Multiple agency public service contracts** - Multiple public service contracts providing the same type of service are not permitted within the same activity.
9. **Public service contract duration** - Public service contracts may have 18-month duration and start on July 1.
10. **Project service delivery costs** - Communities may seek reimbursement for eligible Project Service Delivery Costs. These costs include all eligible items related to the delivery of project services.

11. **Ineligible uses** - CDBG funds may not be used for maintenance of public facilities. The purchase of equipment, fixtures, motor vehicles, furnishings, or other property that is not an integral structural fixture is generally ineligible. CDBG funds may be used to purchase such items when necessary for use in the administration of activities assisted with CDBG funds when such items constitute all or part of a Public Service. For information on the all-project eligibility contact Planning & Evaluation at (248) 858-5312.
12. **Required draws**- 1 draw every 9 months per activity from Letter to Spend date in the HUD Integrated Disbursements and Information System (IDIS).
13. **Required expenditures** - All funds per year per activity must be spent in 2 years from Letter to Spend date in IDIS. After two years, all unobligated funds will be evaluated for possible recapture.
14. **Micro-purchase** - Goods or services \$10,000 or less are considered a micro-purchase and no procurement is required.

The Oakland County CDBG Program Applications are submitted through an online application called Neighborly. Neighborly is an all-in-one web-based application that provides project, financial and compliance management for recipients of federal funding.

- Every community will have their own portal to apply for and manage each of your activities
- Each community can have multiple users to complete applications, review spending activities, and submit payment requests
- You will have instant access to see your current spending activity and funding balance

Oakland County provides all participating communities with a formula-based allocation for Public Services. Funding for Infrastructure, Public Facilities, and other activities funding will be distributed through a competitive process.

If a community would like to apply for multiple projects, you must complete 1 Neighborly submission per each project.

Record Retention - Each participating community must maintain all application documents for at least four years.

Technical Assistance: Neighborhood & Housing Development staff provide technical assistance with submission of the PY2026 Annual Application.

Application Materials - Applications must be fully completed to be considered. Forms are available from Neighborhood & Housing Development staff and/or online.

Due Date: All PY2026 Applications must be received by Friday, December 5, 2025 at 5:00 p.m.

Citizen Participation

Citizen participation is a **mandatory component of the Annual Application**. Each participating community must provide residents with an opportunity to comment on proposed projects.

Step 1. Public Hearing Notification

As part of the Annual CDBG Application process, each participating community must hold a public hearing to receive citizen input on proposed CDBG activities and funding allocations.

The hearing notice must be published **at least 10 days prior to the scheduled public hearing date**. The public hearing must occur before the governing body approves and submits the CDBG application to Oakland County.

Options for Public Hearing Notification

Communities may choose one of the following approved notice methods:

Option 1 – Affidavit of Publication

- Publish the public hearing notice in a newspaper of general local circulation at least 10 days before the hearing date.
- Retain the Affidavit of Publication provided by the newspaper as documentation for the Annual Application.

Option 2 – Web Posting and Certification

- Post the hearing notice on the community's official website and at the city/township/village hall at least 10 days prior to the hearing.
- Option 2 is acceptable only if:
 - The community has adopted an ordinance or resolution authorizing web posting for CDBG public hearings, and
 - This procedure complies with local public hearing notice requirements.
- Provide NHD with a copy of the authorizing ordinance/resolution and a Certification of Posting (location and date).

Each notice must include:

- Date, time, and location of the public hearing
- Purpose: to receive comments on proposed use of CDBG funds for the upcoming program year
- CDBG allocation amount requesting
- Instructions for submitting written comments (location and deadline)
- Accessibility statement, including contact information for accommodation requests (72-hour notice required).

Step 2. Conduct the Public Hearing

The Public Hearing must provide an open forum for citizens to comment on proposed CDBG projects before the governing body takes action to approve and submit the application.

1. Open the public hearing during a regular or special governing body meeting.
2. Record the time the hearing was opened.
3. Allow for public comments (verbal or written).
 - **Citizen comments must occur after the hearing is opened and before it is closed by the governing body.**
4. Close the hearing and record the time it was closed.
5. Proceed with staff or official comments either before or after the hearing period.

Step 3. Document the Hearing and Board Approval

Communities must document that the required public hearing took place and that citizen comments were considered. The record of this hearing must be included in the Annual Application submission to Oakland County.

Documentation Options

Option 1 – Meeting Minutes (True Copy)

The provided copy of the meeting minutes must include the following:

- Roll call of attendees
- Statement opening and closing the public hearing, including times
- Summary or transcript of public comments received
- Motion to approve the CDBG application and funding allocation including the use of outside/leveraged funds
- Vote tally (yea, nay, abstaining, absent)
- Clerk's certification of the meeting as a true copy

Option 2 – Governing Body Resolution

The Governing Body Resolution must include the following:

- Statement confirming the public hearing was held in compliance with CDBG requirements
- Date, time, and summary of public comments
- List of approved CDBG projects and allocation including the use of outside/leveraged funds
- Authorization for the highest elected official or designee to sign and submit the CDBG application
- Vote tally and Clerk's certification

Step 4. Submission to Oakland County

Public hearing documentation is required for an Annual Application packet to be considered complete. The above mentioned Citizen Participation documentation must be uploaded via Neighborly by 5pm on December 5, 2025.

Required Neighborly Submission Materials:

1. Copy of the public hearing notice posted at least 10 days prior to the Public Hearing
 - **Affidavit of Publication or Certification of Posting**
2. **Meeting minutes or resolution** documenting:
 - Opening and closing of the public hearing
 - Summary of public comments
 - Governing body approval of the CDBG application and allocation
3. **Signed CDBG application** and supporting documents

Incomplete Citizen Participation documents will result in applications being denied.

Option #1 allows for the public hearing notice to appear in a newspaper of general local circulation at least 10 days before the hearing.

- The community has approved by ordinance/resolution the use of web posting for CDBG Public Hearings and has provided a copy of the ordinance/resolution to Oakland County Community & Home Improvement
- This procedure does not violate local public hearing notice requirements

Public Services

It is important to distinguish a service from construction or rehabilitation of a facility where a service is being provided. For example, the construction or rehabilitation of a senior center is coded as 03A, but the funding of services provided at a facility for senior citizens is coded as 05A.

- Rental of a facility for a service is considered a part of delivery of service and should be treated as a public service.
- Operation and maintenance may be paid with CDBG funds only for the portion of the building where a public service is being carried out.
- If the activity is restricted to one client group, use the matrix code for that group. For example, use 05A for senior services.
- Income payments are permissible if the payments are made directly to the provider of services on behalf of the individual or family which are used to provide basic services such as food, shelter (including payment for rent, mortgage, and/or utilities) or clothing.
- Income payments that are provided as a loan are permissible within the public services cap.
- To utilize CDBG funds for a public service, the service must be either: A new service; or a quantifiable increase in the level of an existing service which has been provided by the grantee or another entity on its behalf through State or local government funds in 12 months preceding the submission of the grantee's Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan to HUD. An exception to this requirement may be made if HUD determines that any decrease in the level of a service was the result of events not within the control of the local government. This provision was put into place to ensure that localities do not use CDBG funds to replace local or state monies to fund essential services typically offered by the local government entity. Specifically, the public services provision applies in the following manner:
 - If a service is new, it may be funded.
 - If it is determined whether the service was not provided by or on behalf of the local government with funding from the local government, it may be funded.
 - If it was provided by or on behalf of the local government with funding from the State or local government, and it is determined and documentable that the proposed service will be a quantifiable increase in the level of service, it may be funded.
 - The regulations do not prohibit a grantee from continuing to provide funding to a CDBG funded public service at the same or decreased level in subsequent program years.

Notice: CPD-14-016 - Use of CDBG Funds for Code Enforcement Activities

What Is Code Enforcement?

The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (HCDA) and the CDBG regulations permit the use of CDBG funds for selected code enforcement activities. Section 105(a)(3) of the HCDA permits "the use of CDBG funds for code enforcement in deteriorated or deteriorating areas in which such enforcement, together with the public or private improvements or services to be provided, may be expected to arrest the decline of the area." This provision is codified in the CDBG Entitlement program regulations at 24 CFR 570.202(c), which reads as follows:

Code enforcement. Costs incurred for inspection for code violations and enforcement of codes (e.g., salaries and related expenses of code enforcement inspectors and legal proceedings but not including the cost of correcting the violations) in deteriorating or deteriorated areas when such enforcement together with public or private improvements, rehabilitation, or services to be provided may be expected to arrest the decline of the area.

Eligible code enforcement activities assisted under 24 CFR 570.202(c) for entitlement communities do not include the costs of correcting the code violations, which may be an eligible rehabilitation cost, provided a national objective is met. In the Entitlement CDBG program, the rehabilitation costs are separate and distinct from code enforcement activities carried out under 570.202(c). Rehabilitation of buildings and code enforcement activities are also listed in the HCDA as separate eligible activities. The State CDBG regulations do not contain a section listing eligible activities, and the Entitlement eligibility provisions are not binding on states. States may use the Entitlement regulations as interpretive guidance in addition to Section 105(c) of the HCDA. Throughout this Notice, the text will refer to the Entitlement regulations regarding eligible activities; states should refer to the citations from the HCDA.

There are varying definitions and standards for code enforcement. Code enforcement is defined by some jurisdictions as the prevention, detection, investigation, and enforcement of violations of statutes and ordinances regulating public health, safety and welfare. Code enforcement can also include the maintenance and preservation of the value and appearance of residential, commercial, and industrial buildings within its boundaries. Some jurisdictions' code enforcement efforts focus more on buildings and structures, while others are concerned with community cleanliness, public

advertisement displays, garage sales, lawn care, environmental concerns (such as abandoned tires), and the condition of motor vehicles on the streets.

For CDBG program purposes, code enforcement is defined as a process whereby local governments gain compliance with ordinances and regulations regarding health and housing codes, land use and zoning ordinances, sign standards, and uniform building and fire codes. Code enforcement may take place in primarily residential, commercial, and industrial areas. The legislative language requiring "other improvements" to be made to arrest the decline of the area suggests a greater emphasis on structural issues. As a result, the CDBG program will expect that localities emphasize health and safety issues in buildings. Ancillary efforts to address violations of codes concerning vacant lots, signs, and motor vehicles are permitted in conjunction with efforts regarding buildings but should form a minor part of the code enforcement program.

Purpose Of Code Enforcement

Most jurisdictions in the United States have building codes, which are rules that must be followed to comply with the minimum levels of safety for buildings and non-building structures. The objective of these building codes is to ensure the health, safety, and protection of the public in the construction and occupancy of buildings. Building codes affect such matters as structural integrity, fire resistance, lighting, electrical, plumbing, sanitary facilities, ventilation, and seismic design. Therefore, the condition of buildings may be reflected in building, property maintenance, zoning, and/or other locally adopted codes or ordinances, the enforcement of which would all be eligible with CDBG funds.

The purpose of having building codes and enforcement inspections is to protect the public health, safety and welfare. As an example, a house may not have the required number of electrical outlets in each room, which may result in too many items being plugged into an extension cord, resulting in a fire. Additional examples are bathrooms venting into attics, resulting in roof deterioration, and the structural integrity of floor and roof joists.

Code enforcement inspections may also seek to encourage residents (homeowners and tenants) to maintain the appearance and value of their housing units. It is hoped that other residents are motivated to keep their housing units in compliance with local codes because of the good condition of the surrounding housing units. Since this does not always happen, units of government enforce housing codes to ensure that housing units are maintained. Housing units that are well-maintained and meet all local housing

codes and standards protect the health and safety of occupants, improve the value of the residential units in a neighborhood and give such neighborhoods the appearance of being well-maintained. Housing units that are dilapidated and/or vacant may attract squatters, vandals, drug addicts, and rodents.

Code inspections are also done to protect the health and safety of persons utilizing buildings such as public facilities. For example, a privately-owned daycare center utilized by children may have peeling paint on its walls, which may pose a danger to children who may eat it, even if it does not contain lead, or loose floorboards may pose a tripping hazard for children and adults. In addition, the owners of such facilities may face legal liability if someone is seriously injured. This may be the grantee if it is a public facility or a nonprofit carrying out an eligible activity.

Code enforcement can help to reduce crime in a neighborhood, as well. The "broken window" theory was introduced in 1982 by social scientists James Q. Wilson and George L. Kelling. Their research showed that, if broken windows in a structure are not repaired, vandals are more likely to break more windows. Crime levels thus tend to be higher in areas where repairs are not accomplished. Therefore, jurisdictions monitor and maintain buildings, particularly in urban areas, to prevent vandalism and further deterioration so that neighborhoods are well-maintained and experience less crime.

Eligible Code Enforcement Costs

Code Enforcement Inspections - The cost of conducting code enforcement inspections is an eligible CDBG expense. Section 105(a)(3) of the HCDA permits the use of CDBG funds for code enforcement in deteriorated or deteriorating areas in which such enforcement, together with the public or private improvements or services to be provided, may be expected to arrest the decline of the area. The CDBG Entitlement program regulations at § 570.202(c) provide that costs incurred for inspection and enforcement of codes, such as salaries and related expenses of code enforcement inspectors and legal proceedings, are eligible costs. In the Entitlement CDBG program, eligible code enforcement costs do not include the costs of correcting the code violations.

Rehabilitation activities in § 570.202(a) and Section 105(a)(4) of the HCDA are distinct from code enforcement activities carried out under Section 105(a)(3) of the HCDA and § 570.202(c). If a grantee is responsible for code enforcement, that grantee may conduct code enforcement inspections using its own employees. If the grantee contracts for code enforcement inspection services, the cost of procuring a code enforcement inspection company or specialist is an eligible CDBG activity delivery cost. Grantees

may contract with another unit of government to perform code inspections services; hiring another government entity is not subject to procurement requirements at 24 CFR 85.36.

To conduct inspections in various areas within its jurisdiction, code enforcement inspectors may require the use of a vehicle. According to § 570.207(b)(1)(iii), purchase of equipment not an integral structural fixture (such as vehicles) with CDBG funds is eligible when necessary for use by a recipient or its subrecipients in the administration of activities assisted with CDBG funds. However, the grantee must be able to demonstrate that the vehicle is only being used for code enforcement inspections in CDBG-eligible areas. This may require logs to be kept for each trip. The vehicle may not be used for any other purpose. Vehicles may be leased with CDBG funds. Grantees may also purchase vehicles with non-CDBG funds (e.g., general funds) and then charge the CDBG program for their use. In the case of code enforcement, the use allowance is an eligible activity delivery cost [see § 570.207(b)(1)(iii)]. Appendix B, Item 11 of 2 CFR Part 2251 (formerly OMB Circular A-87) describes cost allocation and use allowances and how costs may be maintained for vehicle usage.

Grantees may also use CDBG funds to purchase uniforms and/or coveralls if they are a job requirement for code enforcement inspectors and are a regular city-incurred expense. Appendix A of 2 CFR Part 225 states that for the cost to be allocable to a Federal award, it must be consistent with policies, regulations, and procedures that apply uniformly to both federally-financed and other activities of the non-federal entity. Such costs would be considered activity delivery costs.

CDBG funds also may be used to purchase hand-held computers or tablets to record information as the code enforcement inspection is being conducted. The purchase or lease of such devices is an eligible activity delivery cost. If CDBG funds are used to purchase computers or tablets, the grantee must be able to demonstrate that they are only being used for code enforcement inspections in CDBG-eligible areas. If computers or tablets are leased or are purchased with non-CDBG funds, grantees must ensure that the use charges to the CDBG program are appropriately allocated by the percentage of time they are used for inspections carried out for CDBG purposes in CDBG-eligible areas and for non-CDBG purposes.

Enforcement Actions - The costs of legal proceedings that result from code enforcement inspections are also a CDBG-eligible expense. Grantees or their contractors issue citations and/or fines for code violations. The staff costs associated with processing and issuing the citations, collecting and processing the fines, and postage are all eligible activity delivery costs. The property owner may challenge the

citation or fine assessed. A hearing may be scheduled to ensure that the property owner receives due process. The cost of the hearing is an eligible CDBG expense. The salaries of the hearing officers may be paid with CDBG funds proportionate to the time they spend hearing and deciding the appeals from code enforcement citations or fines resulting from CDBG- assisted code inspections and enforcement expenses. If the grantee pays legal fees to an attorney as part of the proceedings, the grantee may charge to the CDBG program the legal fees allocable to CDBG code enforcement. These costs are considered activity delivery costs under § 570.202(c). A defendant's legal costs are not eligible costs.

1 OMB Circulars A-87, A-110, and A-122, were incorporated into 2 CFR Parts 225, 215, and 230, respectively. On December 26, 2014, the Uniform Administrative Requirements (2 CFR Part 215, A-102), Audit Requirements (A-133) and Cost Principles (2 CFR Parts 225 and 230) will be superseded by 2 CFR Part 200.

Ineligible Code Enforcement Costs

CDBG funds may be used for the costs for inspection of code violations and enforcement of codes in deteriorating or deteriorated areas when such enforcement together with public or private improvements, rehabilitation, or services to be provided may be expected to arrest the decline of the area. While the cost of correcting the violations is not an eligible code enforcement cost under § 570.202(c), the regulation states that code enforcement must be performed in conjunction with improvements, rehabilitation, or services. The purpose of this requirement is to ensure that the deteriorated or deteriorating areas are being made safe and sanitary for the general public, not to generate revenue via code violation fines.

Grantees may trigger concerns about the eligibility of code enforcement if it appears that the CDBG program is being used for general government expenses or if the use of CDBG funding appears excessive in relation to the community's overall enforcement program. As fiscal stress has put pressure on local budgets, HUD has seen examples of significant increases in CDBG code enforcement budgets, while overall spending on enforcement remains the same.

Grantees should use CDBG for code enforcement as appropriate to advance the goals of the CDBG program in areas designated for such activity; HUD is not discouraging the use of CDBG in these cases. However, § 570.207(a)(2) prohibits grantees from using CDBG funds for general government expenses. Code enforcement is an eligible cost that may be paid from local and CDBG funding sources, and grantees have been tempted to shift existing code enforcement efforts to CDBG to relieve pressure on general fund budgets. HUD will look into cases where this appears to be happening to

ensure that CDBG code enforcement activities adhere to the targeting and supporting services required for CDBG eligibility.

The costs of the rehabilitation, improvements, and services are not required to be CDBG- assisted, although some of the rehabilitation and improvement costs may be CDBG-eligible. The cost to rehabilitate single unit housing or multifamily housing structures may be eligible under § 570.202(a) and (b) and Section 105(a)(4) of the HCDA. The rehabilitation of public facilities and improvements on publicly owned buildings is eligible under § 570.201(c) and Section 105(a)(2) of the HCDA.

Rehabilitation of commercial buildings may be eligible under §§ 570.202(a), 570.203(a) or (b) and Section 105(a)(14) of the HCDA. Demolition of buildings may be eligible under § 570.201(d) and Section 105(a)(4) of the HCDA.

Grantees may not use CDBG funds to pay for code enforcement inspections and enforcement in every area or neighborhood or for a grantee's entire jurisdiction (e.g., city- or county-wide) unless the entire jurisdiction is deteriorating. Grantees may use state or local law to determine what constitutes a deteriorated/deteriorating area. The standards identified at §§ 570.208(b)(1) and 570.483(c)(1) may also be used to determine if an area is deteriorated or deteriorating. (See Section VI.B. below.)

National Objectives For Code Enforcement

Low- and Moderate-Income Area Benefit - Code enforcement activities may meet the national objective of benefit to low and moderate income persons on an area basis under § 570.208(a)(1) (for Entitlements) or § 570.483(b)(1) (for states) when carried out in deteriorated or deteriorating areas and when carried out in conjunction with public or private improvements, rehabilitation, or services that may be expected to arrest the deterioration of the area. This national objective may be met when code enforcement inspections are conducted on single or multifamily housing units, commercial buildings, and other publicly or privately-owned buildings. The building or facility being inspected must be located in a primarily residential area where a minimum of 51 percent of the residents in those areas are low- and moderate-income.

Some metropolitan cities and urban counties have few or no areas where 51 percent of the residents are low- and moderate-income. For these grantees, the CDBG law authorizes an exception criterion to be able to undertake area benefit activities. Specifically, Section 105(c)(2)(A)(ii) of the HCDA, as amended, states that an activity shall be considered to principally benefit low- and moderate-income persons when "the area served by such activity is within the highest quartile of all areas within the jurisdiction of such city or county in terms of the degree of concentration of persons of

low and moderate income." This is implemented in the regulations at § 570.208(a)(1)(ii), which identifies the methodology to calculate a grantee's exception threshold. A list of exception grantees is available at

<http://www.hud.gov/offices/cpd/systems/census/lowmod/exception.cfm>.

While residences and other real property in private ownership may be subject to code enforcement, code enforcement of such buildings would not be considered to meet the low- and moderate-income housing national objective (LMH). In addition, code enforcement inspections of public facilities serving presumed beneficiaries such as severely disabled adults, battered spouses, and persons with AIDS would not meet the low- and moderate-income limited clientele national objective (LMC). This is because the costs of the code enforcement actions, by themselves, do not provide a direct benefit to the homeowners or the users of the public facilities. It is the correction of the code violations that directly benefit the residents; thus, the code enforcement must meet the area benefit (LMA) national objective. The rehabilitation or improvement of the homes and public facilities subject to code enforcement address the LMH or LMC national objective criteria.

Prevention or Elimination of Slum/Blight on an Area Basis - Code enforcement activities may qualify under the national objective of prevention or elimination of slums/blight on an area basis under § 570.208(b)(1) (for Entitlements) and § 570.483(c)(1) (for States). Code enforcement activity will be considered to address prevention or elimination of slums or blight in an area if: The area, delineated by the recipient, meets a definition of a slum, blighted, deteriorated or deteriorating area under State or local law; The area also meets the conditions in either paragraph (A) or (B):

- A. At least 25 percent of properties throughout the area experience one or more of the following conditions:
 1. Physical deterioration of buildings or improvements;
 2. Abandonment of properties;
 3. Chronic high occupancy turnover rates or chronic high vacancy rates in commercial or industrial buildings;
 4. Significant declines in property values or abnormally low property values relative to other areas in the community; or
 5. Known or suspected environmental contamination.
- B. The public improvements throughout the area are in a general state of deterioration.

Note that many of the criteria in (i) and (ii)(A) overlap with state or local definitions of slums and blight. Grantees may use some or all of these provisions as the basis for delineating "deteriorated or deteriorating areas" for eligibility purposes, even if the LMA criteria are being used for national objectives purposes. However, grantees are cautioned that there are some limits on their ability to use these requirements for both delineating deteriorated/deteriorating areas and for meeting the slum/blight national objective. For example, a determination that public improvements are in a general state of deterioration can be a basis for defining a slum/blighted area but would not by itself sufficiently justify why a code enforcement program needs to be undertaken on private property in a given neighborhood. Conversely, state or local laws may provide a grantee with sufficient basis to define "deteriorated or deteriorating areas", but do not by themselves qualify an area as slum or blighted for national objective compliance. Some state or local definitions include criteria that have nothing to do with physical conditions of the built environment (such as "undeveloped land" or "inappropriately zoned" parcels.) In these cases, inappropriate requirements should not be included in the basis for a grantee's determinations.

This national objective may be used when carrying out the inspection and enforcement of code violations in areas that are designated as slum or blighted as a way of bringing much-needed improvements to such areas. The area does not have to be primarily residential, and code enforcement need not be limited to residential structures. Commercial and industrial buildings, and sometimes vacant lots, can lead to deterioration as well.

A redetermination of the area must be carried out every 10 years for the area to continue to qualify as a designated slum or blighted area. The grantee must maintain documentation that the area qualified as a slum or blighted area. The documentation must demonstrate the boundaries of the area, the date of the designation, the conditions and standards that qualified the area at the time of its designation in sufficient detail to show how it met the criteria for designation, and how the code enforcement addressed a condition that led to the decline of the area.

Prevention or Elimination of Slum/Blight on a Spot Basis - Please note that code enforcement activities cannot meet the slum/blight spot national objective. The legislation and regulations require code enforcement to be undertaken in deteriorated or deteriorating areas, ruling out consideration of individual structures not located in such areas.

Slum Blight Urban Renewal Completion - Although this national objective rarely applies, it remains an option for the few grantees that have outstanding urban renewal plans or areas. Grantees that want to conduct code enforcement inspections and enforcement in areas identified in the urban renewal plans may do so under the slum/blight urban renewal completion national objective if it is an activity that is necessary to complete the urban renewal plan. The grantee must be able to document this national objective by having a copy of the Urban Renewal Plan in effect at the time of closeout of HUD financial assistance under title I of the Housing Act of 1949 or financial settlement under Section 112 of the HCDA, and a description of how the inspections for code violations and enforcement of codes are needed to complete the urban renewal plan for the area.

Activities Designed to Meet Community Development Needs Having a Particular Urgency - Grantees may experience tornadoes, floods, hurricanes, and other disastrous events that do not rise to the level of Presidential declarations. In this instance, grantees would not receive Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funds to alleviate the effects of the disaster. There may also be areas that experienced Presidentially declared disasters, and FEMA funds were received and exhausted. In both instances, there may remain a need to address the devastation caused by the disaster.

An area that was not previously deteriorated may become so if the effects of the disasters are not fully addressed because of a shortage of funds, and areas that were deteriorating before the disaster may further deteriorate.

Grantees may conduct code enforcement inspections in areas that experienced disasters to ensure that citizens are not residing in homes or frequenting buildings with environmental contaminants and other problems that affect their safety and welfare. Following a disaster, for example, buildings may have mold and mildew, which are environmental contaminants. In such instances, code enforcement may meet the urgent need national objective. In the Entitlement program, grantees must certify that existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health and welfare of the community, the disastrous occurrence is of recent origin (18 months before the grantee's certification) or recently became urgent, that the grantee is unable to finance the activity on its own, and that no other funding resources are available. In the State program, the unit of general local government certifies, and the state determines, that those same conditions exist. Grantees must be able to document that the inspections for code violations and enforcement of codes were designed to address the urgent need, met the timing of the development of the serious condition, and have evidence

demonstrating that no other financial resources were available to address the urgent need.

Please note that if CDBG-Disaster Recovery funds are used, the requirements to document urgent need may differ; and, they may depend on the requirements that apply to the specific appropriation of disaster recovery funds involved.

Other National Objective Compliance Considerations - Grantees must ensure that they are not paying the salaries for code enforcement personnel over their entire jurisdiction, unless the grantee has determined that its entire jurisdiction is deteriorated or deteriorating. The areas where the inspections are being carried out using code enforcement inspectors whose salaries are paid with CDBG funds must be deteriorated or deteriorating. In some communities, this will be areas that demonstrate substantial abandonment or that are designated as slum/blighted areas by local or state law.

Many of the criteria at § 570.208(b)(1)(i) and (ii)(A) overlap with state or local definitions of slums and blight. Grantees may use some or all of these provisions as the basis for delineating "deteriorated or deteriorating areas" for eligibility purposes. However, there are some limits on grantees' ability to use these requirements for both delineating deteriorated/deteriorating areas and for meeting the slum/blight national objective. State or local laws may provide a grantee with a sufficient basis to define "deteriorated or deteriorating areas" but that definition may not meet the state or local law definition to qualify an area as slum or blighted for national objective compliance purposes. In addition, some state or local definitions include criteria that have nothing to do with physical conditions of structures (such as "undeveloped land" or "inappropriately zoned" parcels). The grantee must be careful not to apply inappropriate requirements as the basis for its determinations.

When carrying out eligible code enforcement activities under the slum/blight or urgent need national objectives, grantees should be mindful of the statutory overall low- and moderate- income benefit requirement: over a period of time specified in the grantee's certification, not to exceed three years, not less than 70 percent of CDBG funds shall be expended for activities that benefit low- and moderate- income persons.

Fair Housing And Civil Rights Considerations

Section 109 of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 prohibits CDBG grantees and sub-grantees from conduct that will cause discrimination on the ground of race, color, national origin, religion, or sex, in the participation in any program or activity funded in whole or in part with Federal financial assistance.

Pursuant to 24 CFR 5.105 (a), CDBG grantees and sub-grantees must also comply with various fair housing and civil rights laws, including but not limited to the Fair Housing Act, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Grantees and sub-grantees must assure that all CDBG-funded activities, including code enforcement activities, do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, disability, familial status, or national origin.

Pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, CDBG grantees and sub-grantees should implement affirmative efforts to involve and ensure equal access to people with disabilities; therefore, varied approaches may be required to assure effective communication and information dissemination. For example, the code enforcement agency could ensure that electronic information concerning the building code is accessible to persons with disabilities. As another example, the code enforcement agency could conduct outreach to organizations representing persons with disabilities to inform them about inspection services to ensure compliance with accessibility requirements and about procedures for filing accessibility-related complaints. Also, pursuant to Section 504, the code enforcement agency must ensure that its communications offices and hearing rooms are accessible to persons with disabilities.

Recipients of CDBG funds should take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to their programs and activities to limited English proficient individuals. As an aid to recipients, the Department published Final Guidance to Federal Financial Assistance Recipients: Title VI Prohibition Against National Origin Discrimination Affecting Limited English Proficient Persons (LEP Guidance) in the Federal Register at

72 CFR 2732. For assistance regarding LEP obligations, go to [www.justice.gov/crt/lep/guidance/HUD_guidance Jan07.pdf](http://www.justice.gov/crt/lep/guidance/HUD_guidance%20Jan07.pdf). For more information on LEP, please visit www.hud.gov/offices/fheo/promotingfh/lep.cfm.

Finally, CDBG recipients and subrecipients must affirmatively further fair housing in their use of such funds. Grantees may offer services to affirmatively further fair housing in code enforcement. Such costs, examples of which follow, are not eligible code enforcement expenses but could be eligible as public services or program administrative costs. Both of these categories have caps on the overall activity expenses.

- Providing mobility counseling or referrals to housing counseling agencies for persons temporarily or permanently displaced by code enforcement actions;
- Training staff on fair housing requirements;

- Providing outreach to marginalized populations
- Establishing partnerships with Fair Housing Organizations, state and local fair housing agencies, and community-based organizations representing protected classes under the Fair Housing Act.

Revenue From Code Enforcement Inspections And Enforcement Of Codes

Jurisdictions may assess a fine to the owner of the property that incurred the code violation. Since the fines are the end result of carrying out a CDBG-assisted activity, some grantees have been treating these fines as program income. However, such fines are not program income because they do not meet the definition of program income at § 570.500(a). Rather, revenue from code enforcement fines should be treated either as applicable credits against CDBG expenditures or as general revenue.

Appendix A of 2 CFR Part 225 defines applicable credits as receipts or reductions of expenditure type transactions that offset or reduce expense items allocable to Federal awards. To the extent that such credits accruing to or received by the governmental unit relate to allowable costs, they shall be credited to the Federal award either as a cost reduction or cash refund, as appropriate.

There are two instances that must be met for code enforcement fines to be considered applicable credits: (1) the cost of the inspections for code violations and enforcement of codes, which may include the inspectors' salaries, must have been wholly or partially paid for with CDBG funds, and (2) the intended purpose of the code enforcement fine, as reflected in local law, handbook, manual, etc., is to recover the costs incurred for the code enforcement activities without regard to the source of funds for payment of the code enforcement activity. The second criterion means that local law or procedure requires that collected fines be used to recover the costs of code enforcement, regardless of the source of the funds used to pay these costs. For example, if 50 percent of a code enforcement inspector's salary is paid with CDBG funds and his or her code inspections in Target Area A resulted in \$5,000 in fines being assessed, \$2,500 would be considered an applicable credit against the CDBG expenditure, but only if the intended purpose of assessing the fine is to recover the code enforcement expenditures.

Code enforcement fines should be treated as general revenue if:

1. the purpose of the fine is not to recover the cost of the code inspections and enforcement;
2. the costs of carrying out the code inspections and enforcement were not paid with CDBG funds; or
3. the amount of the fine exceeds the costs paid with CDBG funds.

For example, a jurisdiction may require that revenues from code enforcement fines go into a dedicated fund that is used solely for some other purpose such as after-school education programs. Other income received by governments that may be considered general revenue include income earned from investments and income received from the payment of fines.

2012 Statutory Provision On Code Enforcement

Title II of Division F of the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP- of 2012 (Pub. L. 112-141) amended Section 105(a) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 to add a new Section 105(a)(27) to the HCDA. This provision permitted CDBG funds to be used to supplement existing state or local funding for administration of building code enforcement by local building code enforcement departments, including:

1. increasing staffing;
2. providing staff training;
3. increasing staff competence and professional qualifications;
4. supporting individual certification or departmental accreditation; and
5. capital expenditures specifically dedicated to the administration of the building code enforcement department.

This legislation permitted training for code enforcement staff to be considered an activity delivery cost rather than a program administrative cost. This statute had a sunset date of July 6, 2014; CDBG- assisted activities allowed via this statutory authority are no longer eligible. However, some grantees may have undertaken code enforcement activities under its auspices while it was in effect. In particular, CDBG assistance provided under the authority of Section 105(a)(27) of the HCDA was required to be matched using non-Federal funds as follows:

1. For building code enforcement departments serving an area with a population of more than 50,000, not less than 50 percent of the total amount of CDBG funds provided for this activity;
2. for building code enforcement departments serving an area with a population of between 20,001 and 50,000, not less than 25 percent of the CDBG funds provided for this activity; and
3. For building code enforcement departments serving an area with a population of less than 20,000, not less than 12.5 percent of the CDBG funds provided for this activity.

Section 105(a)(3) of the HCDA and § 570.202(c) also permit the use of CDBG funds to pay the salaries of code enforcement inspectors. Training in code enforcement procedures and practices and paying for courses to increase inspectors' abilities to carry out efficient and proper code inspections and enforcement are eligible as activity delivery costs of CDBG-assisted code enforcement activities under Section 105(a)(3) of the HCDA and § 570.202(c). CDBG assistance under these provisions does not require a match and there is no sunset for these provisions.

Recordkeeping Requirements

The Entitlement CDBG program regulations at § 570.506 identify records that must be kept by grantees carrying out CDBG-assisted activities. The State CDBG program regulations at § 570.490(a) and (b) identify records that states and units of general local government must maintain and provides that the content of records maintained by the state shall be as jointly agreed upon by HUD and the states.

The lack of time distribution records and documentation to demonstrate use of CDBG funds for code enforcement in eligible areas has been a significant problem for some grantees. Not having complete and accurate documentation has resulted in monitoring findings and disallowed costs. Grantees have been required to repay significant sums of money from non-federal funds because they did not maintain records delineating the deteriorated or deteriorating areas, or records demonstrating that the CDBG program only paid for code enforcement costs in those areas. HUD has seen instances in which automobiles were purchased ostensibly for code enforcement purposes solely in defined areas, but the vehicle was assigned to a motor pool with no restrictions on who could use it; those costs had to be repaid. To avoid this problem, grantees should ensure that their records and documentation demonstrate activity eligibility, national objective compliance, allowability of costs, and cost reasonableness. In addition, grantees must ensure that their time distribution records regarding time spent conducting code enforcement in eligible areas is accurate. Having this information

readily available is critical for grantees to avoid monitoring findings and disallowed costs.

At a minimum, grantees are required to have records that provide a full description of each activity being assisted with CDBG funds, including its location, if applicable; the amount of CDBG funds budgeted, obligated, and expended for the activity; and the provision in 24 CFR 570 subpart C or section 105(a) of the HCDA under which it is eligible. In addition, grantees must also have records that demonstrate how activities meet the criteria for national objectives in §§ 570.208 or 570.483. Records that grantees should maintain when carrying out CDBG- assisted code enforcement activities include:

- The state and local law definitions of deteriorated/deteriorating.
- A description of the conditions of the areas in which CDBG funds are used for code enforcement, demonstrating that these areas meet the state local law definition of deteriorated/deteriorating.
- If the low/moderate income area benefit national objective criterion is used, the boundaries of the areas in which CDBG funds are used for code enforcement that demonstrate compliance with this national objective.
- If the slum/blight area national objective criterion is used, the grantee's delineation of the areas inspected as slum/blighted under state or local law; a determination that a minimum of 25 percent of the buildings in the delineated area have either physical deterioration, property abandonment, chronic high occupancy turnover rates, and/or significant declines in property values or abnormally low property values relative to other areas in the community; and documentation of known or suspected environmental contamination.
- If the slum/blight urban renewal national objective criterion is used, the Urban Renewal Plan in effect at the time of closeout of Federal financial assistance under the Housing Act of 1949 or financial settlement under Section 112 of the HCDA, documentation that the urban renewal plan is incomplete, and a description of how the code enforcement inspections and enforcement were needed to complete the plan for the area.
- If the urgent need national objective is used, for entitlement grantees, a certification that the buildings inspected posed a serious and immediate threat to the health and welfare of the community, the disastrous occurrence was of recent origin (18 months before the grantee's certification, and that no other funding resources were available to assist the activity[§ 570.208(c)]. For the State CDBG program, the unit of general local government makes the certification, and the State determines, that the criterion above was met. See§ 570.483(d).

- Identification of other activities to be carried out (whether CDBG-assisted or not) that will arrest the decline of the areas and their funding sources.
- Compliance with the procurement standards at § 85.36 when equipment and services are procured.

Grantees should also be able to justify expenses for necessary equipment and their use (e.g., uniforms/coveralls, handheld computers, gasoline, vehicle lease payments or use allowances). Grantees should maintain salary records (salaries, benefits, timesheets) of code enforcement inspectors being paid with CDBG funds and a description of all areas they are responsible for inspecting. The grantee must also document costs for legal proceedings such as salaries of hearing officers and attorneys.

CDBG funds may be used to pay for salaries, related benefits and costs such as uniforms, equipment, and vehicle use allowances, only for staff responsible for conducting inspections in specific target areas or areas that meet the low- and moderate-income area benefit national objective. Furthermore, such costs should be supported by time distribution records (if costs are treated as direct charges) or an indirect cost allocation plan prepared in accordance with applicable Federal cost principles. Grantees should charge the salaries of hearing officers in the same manner whenever possible. By doing so, grantees can avoid charging the CDBG program for the costs of code enforcement inspections carried out in ineligible areas and/or for charging the entire cost of their code enforcement programs to the CDBG program.

Economic Development

- Matrix codes 17A - 17D should be used to identify special economic development activities carried out by the grantee or through a public or private non-profit subrecipient. Under these matrix codes, CDBG funds are not given to a specific for-profit business or businesses.
- Matrix codes 14E, 18A, 18B, 18C should be used when assistance is provided to a for-profit business for economic development projects.
- Accessibility does not refer only to physical barriers, but also to making the basics of daily living available and accessible affordability by lowering the cost, improving the quality, or increasing the affordability of a product or service to benefit a low-income household. Activities can include affordable housing, basic infrastructure hook-ups, or services such as transportation or day care. When To Consult With Tribes Under Section 106

Section 106 requires consultation with federally-recognized Indian tribes when a project may affect a historic property of religious and cultural significance to the tribe. Historic properties of religious and cultural significance include: archeological sites, burial grounds, sacred landscapes or features, ceremonial areas, traditional cultural places, traditional cultural landscapes, plant and animal communities, and buildings and structures with significant tribal association. The types of activities that may affect historic properties of religious and cultural significance include: ground disturbance (digging), new construction in undeveloped natural areas, introduction of incongruent visual, audible, or atmospheric changes, work on a building with significant tribal association, and transfer, lease or sale of properties of the types listed above.

If a project includes any of the types of activities below, invite tribes to consult:

- significant ground disturbance (digging)**
Examples: new sewer lines, utility lines (above and below ground), foundations, footings, grading, access roads
- new construction in undeveloped natural areas**
Examples: industrial-scale energy facilities, transmission lines, pipelines, or new recreational facilities, in undeveloped natural areas like mountaintops, canyons, islands, forests, native grasslands, etc., and housing, commercial, and industrial facilities in such areas
- incongruent visual changes**
Examples: construction of a focal point that is out of character with the surrounding natural area, impairment of the vista or viewshed from an observation point in the natural landscape, or impairment of the recognized historic scenic qualities of an area

- transfer, lease or sale of a historic property of religious and cultural significance**
Example: transfer, lease or sale of properties that contain archeological sites, burial grounds, sacred landscapes or features, ceremonial areas, plant and animal communities, or buildings and structures with significant tribal association

Inadvertent Discovery Plan for Human Remains or Cultural Items

This document sets forth the protocol to be followed in the event that human remains and funerary objects are encountered during ground-disturbing work on a HUD-funded project. As a statement of general procedure, any human remains encountered will be treated with care and respect. With any ground-disturbing activities, there is the possibility that human remains or artifacts will be encountered.

If human remains, suspected human remains, or cultural items are found, all parties must follow the current guidance from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for the discovery of human remains, copied below (v. 7/19/21):

The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) recommends that the following steps be implemented in the event of the discovery of human remains during a Section 106 project. It largely follows the steps set forward in Michigan Attorney General Opinion No. 6585 of 1989, *Cemeteries and Dead Bodies*.

This sequence of steps assumes that it will not be possible to preserve and maintain a given accidentally discovered burial place.

1. Upon the discovery of human remains, excavation in the immediate vicinity is halted. Cover and secure the area and do not handle finds. All project personnel shall treat any discovery as confidential. Personal photographs of finds may not be taken. The local police authority is immediately notified so that they may evaluate the site.
 2. Inform SHPO Staff Archaeologist Amy Krull (phone 517-285-4211, email krulla@michigan.gov).
 3. If the police determine that the remains do not represent evidence of a crime or missing person, a qualified archaeologist experienced in human remains recovery shall recover the remains and any artifacts that may be present. Archaeological expertise is important in documenting the discovery context and evaluating whether the remains are isolated or if additional remains may be immediately present. Archaeological recovery may be done under the auspices of law enforcement. If law enforcement chooses not to be involved, a permit for disinterment must be obtained from the local Department of Public Health, or through a court order. Human remains and artifacts must be recovered in a respectful manner.
 4. As soon as possible, the remains shall be examined by a physical anthropologist using standard non-invasive methods and procedures to create a basic biological profile and estimate ethnicity.
 5. When the recovery and examination of the remains are complete, results shall be conveyed to the SHPO's archaeology staff, and in cases involving Native American Ancestors, to the appropriate Tribal entity. Final written archaeological reports, physical anthropological reports, and associated law enforcement case documentation must be submitted to the SHPO and appropriate Tribes. Note that Tribes may have special needs regarding the taking and retention of photographs of Ancestral remains.
 6. The final disposition of Native American Ancestors and associated grave goods will be determined in discussions between the property owner and the appropriate Tribal authority at the conclusion of the recovery, examination, and reporting.

If forensics analysis indicates that the human remains are not Native American, disposition and reinterment of the remains will follow guidelines in AG Opinion 6585 (appended).

A local health department permit or court disinterment decree is required before a landowner, excavator or scientific institution or society may disinter human remains.

A local health department permit or court disinterment decree is required before a landowner, excavator or scientific institution or society may disinter partial human remains, where the remains are in a condition from which it may reasonably be concluded that death has occurred.

An "established scientific institution or society" as used in MCL 750.160; MSA 28.357, and 1982 AACRS R 325.8051 means an institution for the advancement or promotion of knowledge or an association organized for the purpose of scientific investigation and pursuits, which has displayed some degree of permanence and longevity.

When an historic period cemetery is disinterred and moved, the disinterred remains must be reinterred in a cemetery located in the same governmental unit or in adjoining governmental units or within a reasonable distance from the municipality where the historic period cemetery is discovered.

The cost of removing bodies from unanticipated burials and reintering them should be at public expense, unless next of kin can be located and are willing to undertake those expenses.

You have requested my opinion on five questions regarding the disinterment of human remains. You have informed me that because the Michigan Department of State is charged with the responsibility for preserving and protecting Michigan's historic and archaeological resources, it has occasion to participate in the disinterment of historic and prehistoric human remains, and is consulted with respect to the subsequent storage or reinterment of those remains. Your questions will be answered seriatim.

Your first question asks:

Is a local health department permit or court disinterment decree required pursuant to MCL 35.841 et seq; MSA 4.1341 et seq, MCL 333.2801 et seq; MSA 14.15(2801) et seq, MCL 750.160; MSA 28.357, or 1982 AACCS, R 325.8051 before a landowner or excavator may disinter human remains? Is the answer different if the disinterer is a scientific institution or society?

The settled policy of this state is to preserve and maintain the burial places of the dead. *Avery v Forest Lawn Cemetery Co*, 127 Mich 125; 86 NW 538 (1901). Consistent with this policy, the Legislature has enacted a number of statutes regulating disinterment or reinterment of human remains.

Section 2853 of the Public Health Code, MCL 333.2853; MSA 14.15(2853), provides in pertinent part:

"(1) A permit for disinterment and reinterment is required before disinterment of a dead body. The local health department in whose jurisdiction the body is interred shall issue the permit upon proper application by a licensed funeral director or person acting as a funeral director in accordance with rules promulgated by the department.

"(2) A person shall not disinter or permit the disinterment of a dead body in a cemetery and the body's reinterment in a cemetery or removal from the cemetery unless a disinterment and reinterment permit is issued by the local health department in the jurisdiction in which the cemetery is located."

It is a basic rule of statutory construction that where the Legislature uses certain and unambiguous language, the plain meaning of the statute must be followed. *Browder v. Int'l Fidelity Ins Co*, 413 Mich 603, 611; 321 NW2d 668 (1982). Although the provisions of MCL 333.2853(2); MSA 14.15(2853)(2), are applicable only to the disinterment of a body located in a cemetery, the provisions of MCL 333.2853(1); MSA 14.15(2853)(1), are not so limited, and clearly and unambiguously require a permit for disinterment and reinterment before disinterment of a dead body.

The other statutes and the administrative rule to which you have referred in no way conflict with the requirements of MCL 333.2853; MSA 14.15(2853).

1982 AACCS, R 325.8051, states:

"A person who inadvertently discovers a burial or parts of a human skeleton shall immediately notify the police authority of the jurisdiction where the remains are found. If preliminary inspection by the police authority indicates that the remains are those of a prehistoric or historic native American, the state archaeologist of the Michigan history division, department of state, shall be immediately notified of the

finding. This rule does not apply to archaeological excavations conducted by representatives of established scientific institutions or societies."

This rule requires that the police be notified following the discovery of human remains. Such notification is required even if the remains are not eventually disinterred. Representatives of established scientific institutions or societies conducting archaeological excavations are exempted from the provisions of this rule, but are still required to obtain a local health department permit for disinterment and reinterment prior to disinterment of a dead body, pursuant to MCL 333.2853; MSA 14.15(2853).

MCL 35.841 et seq; MSA 4.1341 et seq, addresses the disinterment and removal of remains of war veterans for the purpose of reintering such remains in an area set aside exclusively for the graves of United States soldiers, sailors or marines. The Act authorizes the circuit court for the county in which the veteran is buried to enter a decree directing disinterment and removal. MCL 35.841; MSA 4.1341. The Act's applicability is limited to situations where the decree is sought on behalf of the Grand Army of the Republic, the United Spanish War Veterans, the American Legion or the Veterans of Foreign Wars. MCL 35.842; MSA 4.1342. Such a court decree is not necessary before a landowner or excavator disinters remains unless the purpose of disinterment is removal to a special veterans burial area. MCL 35.844; MSA 4.1344, requires that court decrees authorizing disinterment and removal provide that the same be done under the supervision of proper health officials. Where remains are disinterred under local health department supervision pursuant to a court decree, a separate health department permit is not necessary.

Section 160 of the Michigan Penal Code, MCL 750.160; MSA 28.357, states:

"A person, not being lawfully authorized so to do, who shall willfully dig up, disinter, remove, or convey away a human body, or the remains thereof, from the place where the body may be interred or deposited, or who shall knowingly aid in such disinterment, removal, or conveying away, or who shall mutilate, deface, remove, or carry away a portion of the dead body of a person, whether in his charge for burial or otherwise, when the mutilation, defacement, removal, or carrying away is not necessary in any proper operation in embalming the body or for the purpose of a postmortem examination, and every person accessory thereto, either before or after the fact, shall be guilty of a felony, punishable by imprisonment for not more than 10 years, or by fine of not more than \$5,000.00. This section shall not be construed to prohibit the digging up, disinterment, removal or carrying away for scientific purposes of the remains of prehistoric persons by representatives of established scientific institutions or societies, having the consent in writing of the owner of the land from which the remains may be disinterred, removed or carried away."

This section simply makes criminal the disinterment of a dead body by a person who acts willfully and without lawful authority. It would, therefore, not apply to a person who had obtained a proper permit as required by MCL 333.2853; MSA 14.15(2853), or a court decree as provided by MCL 35.841; MSA 4.1341. Nor would it apply to an accidental or unintentional disinterment, although once a person became aware of the presence of a dead body, the person would then be obligated to report the discovery to the police and obtain the necessary permit.

Finally, although not raised in your question, it is appropriate to examine the aboriginal records and antiquities act, as last amended by 1988 PA 452, MCL 299.51 et seq; MSA 13.21 et seq. This Act provides that it is unlawful for a person to remove any human bones without the consent of the landowner, MCL 299.54; MSA 13.24, and further provides that a person shall not explore or excavate an aboriginal remain covered by the Act upon state-owned lands unless the person has obtained a permit from the Director of the Department of Natural Resources with written approval by the Secretary of State. MCL 299.53; MSA 13.23. Violation of any of the provisions of this Act is a misdemeanor. MCL 299.55; MSA 13.25.

It is my opinion, in response to your first question, that a local health department or court disinterment decree is required before a landowner or excavator may disinter human remains, regardless of whether the disinterer is a scientific institution or society.

Your second question asks:

Is a local health department permit or court disinterment decree required before a landowner, excavator, or scientific institution or society may disinter partial human remains, e.g., a femur or a few finger bones?

"Dead body" is defined by Sec. 2803(1) of the Public Health Code, MCL 333.2803(1); MSA 14.15(2803)(1), to mean "a human body, or parts thereof, in a condition from which it may reasonably be concluded that death has occurred."

MCL 333.2853; MSA 14.15(2853), requires that a permit for disinterment and reinterment be obtained before disinterment of a dead body. This provision thus applies to the disinterment of partial human remains where those remains are "in a condition from which it may reasonably be concluded that death has occurred." In general, the discovery of partial human remains would lead to the conclusion that death has occurred, unless the circumstances under which they were found indicated that the remains were the result of a loss of limb which did not result in death, e.g., an accident or amputation.

Additionally, both MCL 750.160; MSA 28.357, and 1982 AACRS R 325.8051 expressly apply to bodies and portions thereof. Therefore, partial human remains may be disinterred only in compliance with this statute and this rule.

It is my opinion, in response to your second question, that a local health department or court disinterment decree is required before a landowner, excavator, or scientific institution or society may disinter partial human remains, where those remains are in a condition from which it may reasonably be concluded that death has occurred.

Your third question asks:

With regard to human disinterment, what is the proper definition of the term "scientific institution or society" as found in MCL 750.160; MSA 28.357, and 1982 AACRS, R 325.8051?

In *Detroit Home & Day School v Detroit*, 76 Mich 521, 523; 43 NW 593 (1889), the court stated:

"[I]t is matter of common knowledge that all general educational establishments have universally been known as 'scientific institutions,' and fall naturally and directly within it. A 'scientific institution,' under the language of all civilized countries, means an institution for the advancement or promotion of knowledge, which is the English rendering of 'science.' "

In a similar vein, a "scientific society" has been defined as any association of individuals organized for the purpose of mutual cooperation in scientific investigation and pursuits. *People v. Cothran*, 27 Hun 344, 345 (NY Sup Ct, 1882).

Additionally, the word "established" connotes some degree of permanency. *Cornell v. Dalpiaz*, 128 NE2d 132, 134 (Ohio App, 1952).

It is my opinion, in response to your third question, that an "established scientific institution or society," as that phrase is used in MCL 750.160; MSA 28.357, and 1982 AACRS, R 325.8051, means an institution for the advancement or promotion of knowledge or an association organized for the purpose of scientific investigation and pursuits, which has displayed some degree of permanence or longevity.

Your fourth question asks:

When an historic period cemetery is disinterred and moved, what are the standards under MCL 128.1 et seq; MSA 5.3165 et seq, concerning where the new cemetery or burial must be located?

1895 PA 49, MCL 128.31 et seq; MSA 5.3071 et seq, authorizes townships to seek and obtain a court order to vacate and remove private cemeteries located within a township for certain specified reasons. MCL 128.31; MSA 5.3071. The Act requires reinterment, at township expense, in the township cemetery or if the township does not have a suitable cemetery, then in a suitable cemetery in an adjoining township. MCL 128.34; MSA 5.3074. If the vacated cemetery belongs to a church or religious society, removal may be made to another suitable cemetery belonging to the same church or society within the township or an adjoining township, instead of to the township cemetery. Id.

1871 PA 164, MCL 128.41 et seq; MSA 5.3081 et seq, authorizes cities and villages to seek and obtain a court order to vacate and remove private and public cemeteries located within their boundaries for certain specified reasons. MCL 128.41; MSA 5.3081. Reinterment, at city or village expense, must be within a city or village cemetery if one exists, and if not, must be in a suitable cemetery within six miles of the corporate limits of the city or village. MCL 128.44; MSA 5.3084.

1929 PA 297, MCL 128.51 et seq; MSA 5.3091 et seq, authorizes the voluntary sale of public and private cemeteries to cities or villages upon order of the circuit court authorizing the vacating of the cemetery and approval of a 3/4 vote of scrip holders or stockholders in the cemetery association. MCL 128.52; MSA 5.3092. In such cases, the Act provides that the cemetery association shall be responsible for interment "within a reasonable distance from such city or village,..." Id. Objecting lot owners shall be separately compensated for removing and reintering dead bodies if removed to a different location. MCL 128.54; MSA 5.3094.

There are no statutes addressing directly the reinterment of human remains, except where removed pursuant to a formal cemetery vacation.

It is my opinion, in answer to your fourth question, that when an historic period cemetery is disinterred and moved, the disinterred remains must be reinterred in a municipal cemetery within the same township, village or city as the remains are discovered and, if no such cemetery exists, in a cemetery in an adjacent township if unearthed in a township or in a cemetery within six miles of the city or village corporate boundary if unearthed in a city or village. It is my further opinion that if the historic period cemetery is known to belong to a church or religious society, reinterment may be in another suitable cemetery belonging to the same church or society located within, or within a reasonable distance from, the township or municipality where the cemetery is discovered. Finally, it must be noted that while the statutes discussed in answer to your fourth question establish certain locations within which a municipality must reinter bodies removed from a vacated cemetery, they do not so limit an individual who may desire to reinter in a different location a body over which he or she may exercise control.

Your fifth question asks:

If a construction project, such as Detroit's people mover, encounters unanticipated burials, who pays for the disinterment and/or reinterment? What if many years earlier, someone had been paid to move the burials?

Relocation of established public or private cemeteries must be pursuant to the vacation procedures set forth in the statutes discussed in response to question 4. In each case, the vacating governmental entity is responsible for costs of disinterment and reinterment.

The Legislature has not addressed the issue of allocation of costs for disinterment and reinterment of burials which are not part of established public or private cemeteries. However, in the event a contractor inadvertently discovers a

burial or parts of a human skeleton, the contractor is obligated to immediately notify local police authorities. 1982 AACRS, R 325.8051. The contractor is also required to obtain a permit from the local health department for disinterment and reinterment before removing the body. MCL 333.2853; MSA 14.15(2853). Under these circumstances, it is most reasonable that local authorities make appropriate efforts to determine and notify any next of kin, who could then claim the body, and if unable to do so, undertake to bury the body at public expense. MCL 52.205(5); MSA 5.953(5)(5). See also MCL 333.2653; MSA 14.15(2653).

It is my opinion, in response to your fifth question, that the cost of removing bodies from unanticipated burials and reintering them elsewhere shall be at public expense, unless next of kin can be located and are willing to undertake those expenses.






